SECRA Metro Manila Meeting: Charting Work Package Progress and Deepening Partnerships for Resilience

The European Commission-funded project Strengthening Enterprise Collaboration for Communities in Asia (SECRA) convened for a week-long project meeting in Metro Manila, Philippines from the 13th to 17th of November 2023. This is the fifth project meeting since 2021. This event gathered consortium members from higher education institutions (HEIs) in Estonia, Sri Lanka, Sweden, Thailand, the United Kingdom, and the Philippines in one venue to discuss enhancing collaborations among the academe, enterprises, governments, NGOs, and other stakeholders to strengthen resilience against disasters and achieve sustainability. The meeting was organized by the Ateneo de Manila University (ADMU), Mapúa Malayan Colleges Laguna (MMCL), and the Philippine Normal University Manila (PNU).

The first day of the SECRA Metro Manila Meeting kicked off with an opening ceremony and keynote talks. The heads of the three Philippine HEIs, Fr. Roberto Yap, President of ADMU, Engr. Anthony Hilmer Medrano, the Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of MMCL, and Dr. Bert J. Tuga, President of PNU, gave their welcoming remarks, which was followed by a cultural show rendered by the PNU Rondalla and the KISLAP Dance Troupe. The cultural show featured a Philippine folk song medley and folk dances. To officially open the project meeting, Dr. Jörgen Sparf, on behalf of his co-SECRA Project Coordinator Dr. Evangelia Petridou, both of the Risk and Crisis Research Centre, Mid Sweden University, gave the opening

remarks, highlighting the five substantive work packages of SECRA.

The morning session featured two keynote talks about the landscape and experience of university-enterprise collaborations (UECs) from the perspective of the public and private sectors. The speakers shared about their different visions and experiences in partnerships with other sectors to pursue sustainability and resilience of the community against disasters. The keynote talks were moderated by Mr. Steve Chavez, Head of the Ideation Support Group at the Ateneo Intellectual Property Office. The first speaker was Engr. Romelen T. Tresvalles, Regional Director of the Department of Science and Technology (DOST) in the National Capital Region. She shared about the initiatives and programs of DOST toward DRRM, including innovation and technologies that enable communities to prepare for disasters, leveraging on the collaborations among the industry, government, civil society, and the academe. The second speaker was Mr. Rene S. Meily. He is the President of Philippine Disaster Resilience Foundation (PDRF), a private sector disaster management organization that includes major business groups. He talked about PDRF's approach at mobilizing the private sector for disaster preparedness and response, leveraging on the resources and equipment of the private companies to deliver relief goods and provide assistance to affected communities.

The afternoon session consisted of a panel discussion focused on local resilience, along with a workshop centered on the psychology of resilience, both organized by MMCL. The panel was moderated by Dr. Roel C. Rodrigo, Director of the Institute for Excellence in Continuing Education and

Lifelong Learning at MMCL and was composed of representatives from the academe, the industry, and the government. Prof. Emma E. Porio from the Department of Sociology and Anthropology, School of Social Sciences, Ateneo de Manila University, and Science Research Fellow, Manila Observatory, was invited to share about the perspective of the academe on climate and disaster resilience. The perspective coming from the government was provided by Dr. Likha G. Minimo, Director for Knowledge Sharing at the UP Resilience Institute. The perspective of the industry was provided by Arch. Alvin Tejada, a Project Management Professional, and an Accredited Professional for LEED, WELL, EDGE, TRUE and GREEEN Building Standards, who is actively involved in sustainable building and climate mitigation causes.

The last program agenda for the first day was the Workshop on the Psychology of Resilience, which was delivered by Ms. Mahjalin Araiza B. Diez, chair of the Psychology Department of MMCL. The participants were enjoined to reflect and share about the 4S of Resilience: the Supportive People, Strategies, Sagacity, and Solution Seeking Behaviors. The participants were divided into groups and shared about their personal resilience plan and the common themes across the insights coming out from reflecting on the 4S of Resilience.

The day culminated with a presentation by Prof. Irene Lill, Head of the Building Lifecycle Research Group at Tallinn University of Technology, focusing on Work Package 7 (WP7). She highlighted insights derived from previous events and underscored the importance of evaluation and communication of feedback to enhance the execution of project activities.

After a full and dynamic first day that set the tone for the event, **the second day** of the SECRA Metro Manila Meeting





opened with a Policy Dialogue with representatives from Philippine government offices and the NGO sector. The Policy Dialogue served as a platform for presenting the Policy Brief crafted by Philippine partners, centered on the initial findings of the SECRA project. This session facilitated a dialogue with sector representatives to glean their perspectives on gaps, barriers, and enablers of UECs in enhancing resilience within the country.

Dr. Charlotte Kendra Gotangco Gonzales, Associate Professor and Director of the Ateneo Institute of Sustainability and Country Lead of the Philippines for the SECRA Project, presented the Policy Brief, which includes gaps and proposed interventions on four identified models of UECs in the country: Student Internship Model, Faculty Immersion Model, Research and Development Model, and Research and Extension Model. The dialogue proper was moderated by Ms. Maria Rhodora R. Austria, the Dean of the ET Yuchengco College of Business and SECRA Lead in MMCL, and Dr. Darryl Roy T. Montebon, Assistant Professor, Director of the Institute of Teaching and Learning and SECRA Lead in PNU.

Key resource persons invited to give their perspective on the policy brief were Director Jose Harry M. Barber, the Officer-in-Charge of the Policy and Development and Planning Service Office of the Civil Defense Central Office; Mr. Elvin Ivan Uy, Executive Director of the Philippine Business for Social Progress (PBSP), the country's largest business-led NGO at the nexus of corporate citizenship, sustainable development, and poverty reduction; Mr. Reuel Ruiz, the Program Head of Startup QC Local Economic Investment and Promotions Office, Quezon City Government; Mr. Eugene Garcia, Education Program



The rest of the day consisted of internal discussions on the Policy Briefs of the consortium members from Asia and updates and announcements on Work Package 6 (WP6) on dissemination and exploitation activities.

Dr. Montebon, on behalf of the Philippine partners, provided an update on their policy brief, outlining the initial feedback received from pertinent stakeholders gathered during roundtable discussions. Additionally, insights were shared regarding the subsequent steps undertaken to refine and enhance the policy brief based on the received feedback.

Dr. Pichaya Poonlarp, Associate Dean of the Agro-Industry Faculty, and Dr. Sorraya Khiewnavawongsa, Assistant Dean at Chiang Mai University, representing the Thailand partners, delivered updates on their policy dialogue. They detailed their process, which involved conducting interviews with key representatives from various sectors such as in the Federation of Thai Industries, small and medium enterprises, the stock exchange of Thailand, provincial and district coordination committees, and university council members. Furthermore, they presented findings from the interviews and the proposed initiatives to address identified problems.

Representing the Sri Lanka partners, Prof. Rukmal Weerasinghe, from the Department of Entrepreneurship at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura, provided an overview of their policy brief and dialogue. He elaborated on the Sri Lankan context and the process of crafting and refining

their policy brief, which included workshops in Colombo and during the project meeting in Naresuan, peer review process, and translation to Sinhala and Tamil languages. Prof. Weerasinghe also outlined the ten policy recommendations formulated for UEC aimed at fostering economic recovery and resilience in Sri Lanka. Additionally, he delineated the forthcoming strategies involving continued policy dialogues to further advance these initiatives.

Following Prof. Weerasinghe's presentation, Prof. Roshan Dharshana Yapa, Director of the Business Linkage Innovation and Technology Transfer Office (BLII-TTO) at the University of Peradeniya, shed light on the pivotal role and advancements of University Business Linkages (UBLs) in Sri Lanka, spotlighting BLII-TTO as a case study. He recounted a success story illustrating how UBLs effectively addressed resilience during the pandemic. Additionally, Prof. Yapa highlighted potential avenues for UBLs to tackle the financial crisis in Sri Lanka, emphasizing the establishment of collaborative research laboratories bridging academia and the private sector, among other significant opportunities.

After Prof. Yapa's presentation, Mr. Thisara Uduwarage, a PhD Researcher affiliated with the Global Disaster Resilience Centre at the University of Huddersfield, took the floor to provide updates and announcements related to WP6. He discussed the progress of quarterly newsletters and press releases, highlighting the strategic plans to effectively expand the project's reach to a broader audience. Mr. Uduwarage emphasized the crucial role of these communication initiatives in not only disseminating the project's outcomes but also in paving the way for applying these insights to enhance resilience across Asia.

Similar to the first day, the second day ended with a presentation by Prof. Lill on the feedback from the first day and allowed time for the participants to input their evaluation of the current day's activities.

On the third day, the agenda consisted of work package (WP) updates and workshops, and a campus visit to the Ateneo de Manila University. The campus visit featured talks on UECs, student pitches, a sustainability walk, and art gallery tour.

Dr. Sarita Jane Robinson, Deputy Head of the School of Psychology and Computer Science at the University of Central Lancashire, delivered updates on Work Package 1 (WP1). She provided an overview and updates of the process and outcomes of WP1 and involved the consortium in a reflective exercise. Dr. Robinson encouraged each in a reflective exercise. Dr. Robinson encouraged each member

to reflect about the personal and professional impacts of SECRA on their lives. These reflections were written onto feedback airplanes, making for an engaging activity where participants flew their planes towards a designated target prize, fostering a friendly and participative atmosphere to start the day's activities.

After WP1, Work Package 2 (WP2) followed with a presentation by Dr. Kinkini Hemachandra, Lecturer in the Department of Management at the University of Huddersfield, and Mr. Thisara Uduwarage. Among the topics covered in this session were the relational framework developed based on the literature review on UECs with Asian partner countries and research on integrating multihazard tools for preparedness and disaster resilience.

Following the morning sessions, the consortium members traveled to the Ateneo de Manila University for a campus visit. The consortium gathered at the Ateneo Blue Nest, located in the Eduardo J. Aboitiz Sandbox Zone of the Areté, Ateneo de Manila University. The Blue Nest is a Technology Business Incubation (TBI) initiative supported by the Philippine Department of Science and Technology (DOST). The campus visit began with Welcoming Remarks by Dr. Filomeno Aguilar, Jr., Assistant Vice President for Research, Creative Work, and Innovation. This was followed by 15minute flash talks by the implementing partners of the SECRA Project within ADMU: the Ateneo Institute of Sustainability (AIS), the Ateneo Research Institute of Science and Engineering (ARISE), the John Gokongwei School of Management (JGSOM), and the Ateneo Intellectual Property Office (AIPO). They were represented by Dr. Charlotte Kendra Gotangco Gonzales, Dr. Emilyn Q. Espiritu, Mr. Joselito Olpoc, and Dr. Proceso L. Fernandez, respectively.

The afternoon also featured a student pitching event, which was organized as a Start-up Lab under Work Package 4 (WP4). Implementing partners from ADMU partnered with the DECSC25 (Creative Thinking and Innovation Management) class of Ms. Paula Atun, Instructor at the





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Department of Quantitative Methods and Information Technology of JGSOM; students from partner HEI Mapúa Malayan Colleges Laguna (MMCL) also participated in the event. Project leads Dr. Jörgen Sparf and Dr. Evangelia Petrido from Mid Sweden University, WP4 lead Dr. Sarita Jane Robinson and Dr. Andrew Carmichael from the University of Central Lancashire, and Engr. Benjamin Mirasol of AIPO served as the judges for the competition. A total of 26 students, organized into six groups, participated. Each of the six groups presented their pitches, which was followed by questions from the panel of judges. EcoEats, a group of students from ADMU, was announced as the champion, and Vitastrip, a group of students from MMCL, was announced as the first runner-up. Both groups won a 3-month incubation at AIPO, and the winning group won additional tokens from AIS and JGSOM.

The formal program closed and participants were directed to their respective Activity Hours, where some consortium members took a self-guided tour of the Ateneo Art Gallery at the Areté building, and some took a guided Sustainability Walk around some of the sustainability-related initiatives around ADMU. Dinner was prepared upon their return to the Blue Nest, with remarks by Dr. Genejane Adarlo and Dr. Roberto Martin Galang, OIC of the School of Science and Engineering and Dean of the John Gokongwei School of Management, respectively.

The fourth day of the Metro Manila Meeting began with a session for Work Package 3 (WP3), led by Dr. Evangelia





Petridou of Mid Sweden University and Dr. Chaminda Senarathna Bandara of the University of Peradeniya. Consortium members were divided into groups and encouraged to work with members from other HEIs and countries to discuss the sustainability of the SECRA Project beyond the project cycle. The session for WP4 discussed an overview of the requirements of the deliverables and information needed for reporting purposes, and was led by Dr. Sarita Jane Robinson and Dr. Andrew Paul Carmichael of the University of Central Lancashire. Dr. Charlotte Kendra Gotangco Gonzales of the Ateneo de Manila University and Ms. Aleesha Lad of the University of Central Lancashire also presented.

Work Package 5 (WP5) followed lunch, which discussed the Compass Tool, and was led by Dr. Jörgen Sparf of Mid Sweden University and Prof. Lasith Gunawardena of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. Consortium members were divided by HEI and discussed implementation plans; the Asian partner HEIs were clustered together so that each group would have one HEI from each of the three partner countries to foster collaborative dialogue and glean potential best practices and strategies.

Information on the succeeding Project Meeting in Sri Lanka was shared by Prof. Ranjith Dissanayake of the University of Peradeniya. The day was capped with a Steering Committee Meeting.
